


So if you need a Mask bring one, if you need to distance yourself by all means do so. If you need a ride call a friend or call me, but get off your butt and get back in the game.

Recently Central Maine Det.# 810 in conjunction with the Lewiston/Auburn Veterans Council, dedicated a Vietnam War/Vietnam Era Memorial along with a Park Bench on November 11, 2021 Veterans Day.

I brought the idea forward and was given permission to go forward with the fund raising. I had planned on going to the Veterans Park in Lewiston, ME on every Wednesday from 10am to noon. My goal was to raise \$6500.00 and I would do as many Wednesday's as necessary to accomplish that goal. I



started on Jan. 6th and at the end of 3 Wednesday I had reached my goal of \$6500.00 +. I had raised enough money for a Memorial and a Park bench. I have enclosed some pictures. I thought this would make a nice article for the news letter. Just goes to show what the Marine can do attitude can accomplish. Semper Fi, Charlie Paul

I thought I would add the this article to this story LEWISTON — Veterans of the Vietnam War will soon have their own memorial monument in Veterans Memorial Park. Charles Paul of Norway, who served 25 months in Vietnam and has worked with the Lewiston Auburn Veterans Council for the past seven years, is leading the effort to place a granite monument in the park that overlooks the Great Falls between Lewiston and Auburn.

"I've traveled around to see what other veteran organizations have done in the state," Paul said. "Lewiston-Auburn doesn't have a Vietnam War memorial in the park. It's time for me to turn my actions onto deeds."

While not in the park, one of the three bridges that cross the Androscoggin River between the Twin Cities is dedicated to Vietnam Veterans. Both sides have a monument list-



ing the names of 29 residents who died in Vietnam.

The proposed monument would be 22 inches wide, 12 inches thick, with the front 38 inches high and the back 48 inches high. The front of the marker will have the word "Vietnam War" with the years underneath. Below that will be a montage of the Vietnam War, showing helicopters, tanks and soldiers. The top of the monument will be polished with the inscription, "For those who have served and fought for it, freedom has a taste that the protected will never know."

In the fundraising appeal, Paul and the L-A Veterans Council say, "Take your place in Lewiston/Auburn history and help us create a monument to honor the courage and commitment, traits that have always been with our military personnel. Help us create a lasting tribute to our men and women who served during one of America's most controversial wars. Help us welcome home a group of veterans who did their job and received a nation's scorn on their return.

Paul, who served in the Marines as a radio operator working with both ground and air units for more than two years from 1966 to 1968, will be at Veterans Park every Wednesday from 10 a.m. to noon starting Jan. 6 to seek donations and show a large poster with an image of the monument.

Greetings Marines,

Happy new year and welcome to 2022. The challenges of the Coronavirus and 2021 are not behind us or the Young Marines program. The recent surge in cases and the increased transmissibility of the Omicron version have impacted many units' ability to gather and conduct training due to COVID mitigations and measures which many units are employing to keep its staff and YMs safe.

The challenges of COVID are not stopping the adult staff and units from planning activities and events for the remainder of the year. YM Headquarters recently concluded registration for the variety of Summer Programs, Adventures, Challenges and Encampments (SPACES) being offered to YMs across the nation. While some past events have been eliminated, many new opportunities have been added to the offerings. These opportunities do have a cost and many YMs and their families are responsible for the registration fees associated with these events. For this reason, many MCL detachments have been able to offer scholarships or financial assistance to YM units to help get these deserving young people to enrichment activities and leadership training. Please consider contacting local YM units to see if there is a need for support or assistance.

This time also marks the start of the election process for all YM unit leaders. The Unit Commander and Executive Officer at all units are elected positions, and voting is open to all

registered adult volunteers of the unit, regardless of billet or tenure at the unit. Please use this as an opportunity to reach out to the adult staff of your local YM units to understand the personnel roles and potentially any changes within the unit leadership team. Commanders at the battalion, regiment and division level are all appointed positions, made by the commander of the immediate higher echelon of command. Appointments are generally two-year terms.



February March Marine Corps History



FEBRUARY

1 February 1967: Operation Prairie II was begun in Quang Tri province by elements of the 3d Marine Division. During the 46-day search-and-destroy operation which terminated 18 March, 93 Marines and 693 of the enemy were killed.

2 February 1944: The 4th Marine Division, as part of the first assault on islands controlled by the Japanese before the start of World War II, captured Namur and eight other islands in the Kwaialein Atoll.

6 February 1968: Two reduced Marine battalions, the 1st Battalion, 1st Marines with two companies, and 2d Battalion, 5th Marines with three, recaptured Hue's hospital, jail, and provincial headquarters. It would take three more weeks of intense house to house fighting, and nearly a thousand Marines killed and wounded, before the imperial city was secured.

11 February 1922: BGen John H. Russell was appointed U.S. High Commissioner and personal representative of the President to the government of Haiti. This nine-year assignment placed this future Commandant in supreme command of both the occupying American force and the Haitian Gendarmerie.

15 February 1998: One hundred years ago this date, 28 Marines and 232 seamen lost their lives when the battleship MAINE was mysteriously sunk by an explosion in the harbor of Havana, Cuba. Though no definitive evidence linked the Spanish with the sinking, the cry went up, "Remember the Maine!", and by late April the U.S. and Spain were at war.

17 February 1967: The first full day of Operation DECK-HOUSE VI, which lasted until 3 March, was conducted near Quang Ngai city. The Special Landing Force (BLT Y4 and HMM-363) accounted for 280 enemy killed.

23 February 1945: Four days after the initial landings on Iwo Jima, 1stLt Harold G. Schrier led 40 men from Company E, 2d Battalion, 28th Marines, up Mt. Suribachi to secure the crest and raise the small American flag that battalion commander LtCol Chandler Johnson had given Schrier. Within an hour, the patrol reached the rim of the crater. After a short fire-fight with Japanese defenders emerging from several caves, the small American flag was attached to an iron pipe and raised over the island.

24 February 1991: The I Marine Expeditionary Force and coalition forces began a ground assault on Iraqi defenses in the final chapter of Operation Desert Storm. The 1st and 2d Marine Divisions stormed into the teeth of Iraqi defenses while heavily armored allied forces attacked the Iraqi defenses in Iraq from behind. In 100 hours, U.S. and allied forces defeated the Iraqi Army.

28 February 1991: Operation Desert Storm ended when the cease- fire declared by President George Bush went into effect. I Marine Expeditionary Force has a strength of more than 92,000 making Operation Desert Storm the largest Marine Corps operation in history .A total of 24 Marines were killed in action during the Gulf War.

March

2 March 1867: Jacob Zeilin, Colonel Commandant of the Marine Corps from 30 June 1864, was this date promoted to the rank of Brigadier General Commandant, the first time Congress authorized this rank for the Marine Corps. The statute, however, was repealed in June 1874 so that the rank of Commandant would again revert to colonel upon Zeilin's retirement

8 March 1965: The 9th Marine Expeditionary Brigade landed at DaNang, Republic of Vietnam as the first U.S. ground combat troops to be committed to that conflict. The 3,500 men arrived both across the beach with Battalion Landing Team 3/9, and at DaNang Airfield with Battalion Landing Team 1/3.

11 March 1778: Marines participated the action when the Continental Navy frigate BOSTON, enroute to France, sighted, engaged, and captured the British merchant ship MARTHA. As the drum of the BOSTON beat to arms, John Adams seized a musket and joined the Marines on deck until the frigate's captain, Samuel Tucker, sent him below for safety.

13 March 1943: The first group of71 Women Marine officer candidates arrived at the U.S. Midshipmen School (Women's Reserve) at Mount Holyoke College in South Hadley, Massachusetts. The Navy's willingness to share training facilities enabled the Marine Corps to begin training Marine Corps Women's Reserve officers just one month after the creation of the MCWR was announced.

17 March 1967: The first woman Marine to report to Vietnam for duty, Master Sergeant Barbara J. Dulinsky, began her 18-hour flight to Bien Hoa, 30 miles north of Saigon. MSgt Dulinsky and the other officer and enlisted Women Marines that followed were assigned to the Military Assistance Command, Vietnam (MACV) based in Saigon. Most worked with the Marine Corps Personnel Section providing administrative support to Marines assigned as far north as the DMZ, but two Lieutenant Colonels, Ruth Reinholz and Ruth O'Holleran, served as historians with the Military History Branch, Secretary Joint Staff, MACV.

25 March 1945: After 35 days of bitter fighting, the amphibious assault on the rocky fortress of Iwo Jima finally appeared over. On the night of 25 March, however, a 300-man Japanese force launched a vicious final counterattack in the vicinity of Airfield Number 2. Army pilots, Seabees and Marines of the 5th Pioneer Battalion and 28th Marines fought the fanatical Japanese force till morning but suffered heavy casualties -- more than I00 killed and another 200 American wounded. Nearly all of the Japanese force was killed in the battle.

27 March 1953: The 5th Marines, supported by the 2d Battalion, 7th Marines, in the first full day of fighting after the Chinese assault the previous evening of Outpost Vegas on Korea's western front, counterattacked to regain enemy-held positions. Companies E and F of 2/7, down to only three platoons between them, managed to regain partial control of Outpost Vegas that day.

31 March 1801: On this date, LtCol Commandant William W. Burrows rode with president Thomas Jefferson to look for "a proper place to fix the Marine Barracks on." President Jefferson was a personal friend of the Commandant, and deeply interested in the welfare of the Corps and accompanied Burrows on horseback on the morning of 31 March. They chose a square in Southeast Washington, bounded by 8th and 9th streets, and a & I streets, because it lay near the Navy Yard and was within easy marching distance of the Capitol.



Regardless of the situation, the Marine Corps has an answer for almost everything.

A Marines Prayer

Almighty Father, whose command is over all and whose love never fails, make me aware of Thy presence and obedient to Thy will. Keep me true to my best self, guarding me against dishonesty in purpose and deed and helping me to live so that I can face my fellow Marines, my loved ones, and Thee without shame or fear. Protect my family.

Give me the will to do the work of a Marine and to accept my share of responsibilities with vigor and enthusiasm. Grant me the courage to be proficient in my daily performance. Keep me loyal and faithful to my superiors and to the duties my Country and the Marine Corps have entrusted to me. Help me to wear my uniform with dignity, and let it remind me daily of the traditions which I must uphold.

If I am inclined to doubt, steady my faith; if I am tempted, make me strong to resist; if I should miss the mark, give me courage to try again.

Guide me with the light of truth and grant me wisdom by which I may understand the answer to my prayer.
